

Whether it is in collaboration or consolidation, the healthcare market is abound with disruptions as healthcare providers adapt to the changing healthcare landscape.

With changing reimbursements and steeper cuts to operating margins, health systems are looking for every possible avenue to cut costs across all areas of the system. This shift in the healthcare industry has led many hospitals to develop creative contracting strategies where risk is being shared by multiple parties. In a risk-sharing, performance-based contract, suppliers assume risk if goals are not met but could participate in an upside if various performance standards are met.

This session will discuss the shift to risk-sharing contracts and how the supplier / Hospital contracting relationship is evolving. We'll also analyze how providing both small and large scale disruptions will shape the future of healthcare while discussing tips and strategies for navigating these disruptions.
